Where do we find the balance? Do we "conquer" today as if there was no tomorrow, or do we kick back eat, drink and be merry?




Rome's birthplace...the Palatine hill ± 750BC

was more optimistic) if we would become part of that grim statistic (90% of the missionaries that come here, leave within 2 years not to return). Praise God, we are beating the statistic... Just over a year ago, we started our first Bible study with the "magnificent 7"; today we are running 3 different ones with 42 to 45 people attending and are still praying for the timing to launch a new church (since we have a critical size of potential attendees). As mentioned in a previous email, at times I feel guilty sharing with you stories of new converts as if I were hunting for big game and those souls are displayed as "trophies on a wall". Having said that, if the angels rejoice in heaven for new additions to the kingdom, why not rejoice on earth

Ask a New Yorker and he will say the first; ask a Roman and he will vote for the second affirmation! I think identifying what is truly important in life (*richness toward God*) will eliminate what *we may consider urgent* that robs us of precious moments. Focusing on the eternal, with our gaze upwards, will also strengthen us during those more difficult times. I once heard that "it's not circumstances that steal our joy, but the wrong attitude in those circumstances".

James 1 urges us to stand firm in such trials giving proof that **our faith is sound** because it is not predicated on circumstantial occurrences (it is happiness that depends on happenings). I am the first one that needs to have this reality imbedded in my core and pray the same for you.

Latest happenings:

- Some of you saw this shocking statistic: In Italy 70% of the population prays to saints; 31% prays to Padre Pio (a friar that received the stigmata in 1918 and kept them to his death in 1968), Christ comes in 7th place with a meager 2%. I found some comfort last week as I traveled to Ferrara with a monsignor, a judge that served next to Cardinal Ratzinger for 15 years. We had a chance to talk for more than 6 hrs (our train ride) about different theological arguments including this

shocking statistic. I was very encouraged to find out that he agrees this statistic reveals what the institutional church is transmitting to its people! By the way the reason we are talking is because a home (a 500 yrs old 20,000 sq ft mansion) was put at his disposal for a "Christian cause". He would like to turn it into a recovering center for alcoholics, but does not have the know-how on putting it together. Since I know an evangelical Spanish businessman that has recuperated over 150,000 alcohol/drug dependants and prostitutes in over 60 countries, I put them together. One of the fundamental "musts" for the people he has rehabbed, is regular Bible study and on site work. This would be a creative way to have an evangelical influence with the Catholic church.
